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BE PREPARED BEFORE A STORM STRIKES

In the event of a power outage, be prepared by keeping the following items in an easy-to-find emergency supply kit.



WATER

Three-day supply, one gallon per person per day.



TOOLS

Flashlight, extra batteries, manual can opener, battery-powered or hand-crank radio, NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert.



FIRST AID KIT AND PRESCRIPTIONS

First aid supplies, hand sanitizer and at least one week's supply of prescriptions and medications for the family.

Be Prepared for Spring Storms

We've all heard the saying that "April showers bring May flowers." But are you prepared for a spring shower to turn into a threatening storm? While not all damage can be prevented, being prepared can help minimize damage and reduce injury or death.

In the case of a severe storm, familiarize yourself with these terms to help identify the hazard.

Storm Watch – tells you when and where a severe storm is likely to occur. Watch the sky and stay tuned to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio or television for information.

Storm Warning – issued when severe weather is already occurring. Warnings indicate imminent danger to life and property to those in the path of the storm. Take shelter immediately.

Here are some helpful tips from Parke County REMC for staying safe before, during and after a storm hits.

Before the storm

- Make sure your cell phone is charged.
 Consider purchasing an external battery pack for extended battery life.
- Program the phone number of Parke County REMC into your cell phone in case you need to report a power outage. Our number is 765-569-3133 or toll free, 800-537-3913.
- Have a battery-operated radio available so you can stay updated on the latest weather watches and warnings.
- Unplug appliances and electronics, such as computers and televisions. Damage can occur from power surges as a result of lightning strikes. Consider adding surge protectors in the event you are unable to unplug the devices.
- Know where the manual release lever of your electric garage door opener is located and how to operate it.
- · Remove dead or rotting trees on your prop-

- erty that could cause damage to power lines or your home during a storm.
- Have an emergency kit ready and create a family communication plan.

During the storm

- Don't use corded phones or electrical devices that are plugged in.
- Only use flashlights for emergency lighting, candles can cause fires.
- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed.
 Most food requiring refrigeration can be
 kept safely in a closed refrigerator for
 several hours. A full freezer will keep the
 temperature for about 48 hours.
- Don't leave your vehicle during a storm. If a downed power line falls on your vehicle, stay in the vehicle unless it's life threatening. Call 911. If you must exit the vehicle, shuffle away with small steps, keeping your feet together at all times.

After the storm

- Watch out for debris or downed power lines. Because downed power lines could still be energized, do not touch them or any objects in contact with them. Call Parke County REMC to report the downed lines.
- If you notice frayed wiring or sparks, or smell a burning odor, shut off the electrical system at the main circuit breaker immediately.
- Only use generators away from your home and never run a generator inside a home or garage.
- After a power outage, throw away any food that has been exposed to temperatures above 40 degrees Fahrenheit for two hours or more or that has an unusual odor, color or texture. When in doubt, throw it out!


